Phase I

- Community Outreach
 - Resolutions of Support
 - Steering Committee Development
 - Presentations to Civic Groups

Phase II

- Plan Preparation (6-8 Months)
 - Steering Committee selects consultant
 - Prepares draft plan
 - Presents draft plan to public/revises as necessary

Phase III

- Plan Adoption (3-4 Months)
 - Presentation to Advisory Boards
 - Adoption by all Municipal and Governing Boards








The Avon Creek Greenway And The Catawba Creek Greenway



















Response: when asked how important trails and greenways are in Mecklenburg County?






Response: when asked how often the participant utilizes trails or greenways?





Response: when asked how the participant would intend to use trails and greenways in the future?






